Message From the Principal

Dear Parent / Carer

It was with great pleasure that I was able to share our Ofsted report with you and the wider community last Friday. The report fully recognised what a special place Rushden Academy is and the significant improvements made under Mrs Burton's leadership. What it meant to the highly dedicated and committed staff could truly be seen in the emotions shared following the official release of the report. The report provided external validation of all the hard work undertaken by staff and recognised that both the children and the wider community value the education we provide. I have never been prouder to be a part of Team Rushden.

Mr Billam's assembly this week centred on the theme of ambition and he shared many examples of individuals who had overcome significant barriers to success, JK Rowling, Billy Monger and Lewis Hamilton to mention just a few. The assembly encouraged all students to reflect on their future goals and think about how we can support them in realising those goals.

Year 7 were also given an extraordinary assembly which was delivered by Police Community Support Officer, Stephanie Bacon, on the topic of 'County Lines'. We always welcome additional input from outside organisations to enhance our personal development curriculum particularly where they can add a unique insight that we can't. You may or may not be aware of what county lines is but it is an important part of the statutory Relationships and Sexual Health Education framework as it teaches students to recognise the signs of people involved in county lines or those trying to recruit students to be a part of county lines. If you have any concerns about this topic or would like further information on recognising signs of involvement, please do not hesitate to contact the school and we can advise you further.

On Thursday night, we hosted our Open Evening for prospective parents and students in order to give an insight into all of the incredible opportunities and experiences we offer to the students within our care. We had a staggering, 600+ people, who attended over the course of the evening and were able to listen to some of our exceptional student leaders talk about what it is like to be a part of Team Rushden. Following the talk, they were able to visit the different subject areas, talk to teachers and students about the different subjects, and experience a range of challenges and activities linked to the different subject areas. The feedback from those that attended was overwhelmingly positive which was testament to the effort of our students and staff alike in explaining the amazing things we do here at Rushden Academy.

Creative Arts Update



This term in the Creative arts students across the Academy have been very busy.

In year 7 we have been learning about Line and Pattern, as the building blocks for our Line, Pattern and Colour Project. We have learnt about Organic and Geometric patterns, the qualities of line, and have been practising creating patterns ready for our 'Crazy Hair' or 'Initial Letter' designs. We are focussing on securing these basics, as they will underpin all our learning for the next three years in Creative Arts.



In year 8 we have been studying the work of Pop Artist Roy Lichtenstein. We have been using Watercolours to create bold and striking colours, and have been learning how to mix accurate colours and apply the paints neatly. The intricate dot sections have tested our patience and resilience, but we have learnt key skills which will support the development of our artwork throughout the next two years. We will soon be ready to present our finished paintings, alongside research about the artist and the Pop Art Movement.



Creative Arts Update Continued...

In year 9 we have been securing our observational skills looking at still life, with a project inspired by Paul Cezanne. We have been working on artist copies of his work, using watercolour, and have been focusing on accurate colour mixing and application of paint to show brush strokes and texture. We will soon be ready to present our paintings alongside research about the artist, and will then be moving on to create our own paintings and drawings inspired by Cezanne's work.



In year 10 art we have been working towards our GCSE Coursework, which will be complete by Christmas 2023 ready for our Exam Unit. This term we have been learning a range of new techniques in Black and White media, from different ways to use a fineliner, exploring mixed media drawings, and getting messy with charcoal and chalks, we have each chosen from a broad selection of images linked to Still Life, and will soon be ready to present our work as mounted sheets for the first coursework deadline.

After half term we will be exploring coloured media in depth, including acrylic painting, oil pastel and chalk pastel, and will begin to identify our strengths and passions before choosing artists who inspire us to form the basis of the rest of our projects.



In year 10 photography we have been researching and analysing the work of American Photographer Irving Penn. We have explored the themes within his still life and portraiture work, and its link to Vanitas and Memento Mori concepts. We have learnt how to present photographic research visually, and how to conduct in-depth independent analysis of visual elements such as colour, composition and subject matter. We will be going on to create photographic outcomes of our own inspired by his and other photographers' work.

Creative Arts Update Continued...

In year 10 graphics we have been refining our skills in line, pattern and colour, and have been working on applying graphic pattern designs to typeface to create a bold typography-inspired piece, which we will go on to render in colour, learning about colour schemes, and which we will also explore digitally to develop our digital illustration skills.



Our Year 11 students, in Art, Photography, and Graphics have been working hard to complete their coursework ahead of the exam release in the New Year. Individual projects are taking shape and students are working towards developing final pieces to conclude their projects.

In year 12 Art we have completed our transition work on the theme of a single colour, and have now started working on our Personal Investigation projects. Students have come up with their own project themes which will continue until January 2023. We are still in the very early stages of our visual research, but already have some very exciting and creative projects emerging, from Dystopian Landscapes, to Anatomical Architecture, and A study of Minerals and Fossils.

In year 12 Photography we have been working on their first project about colour. Within this project they chose a colour and completed a range of research which will be the starting point for their own imagery. They are experimenting with light, studio photography and location shoots to ensure their research has had an impact. Their sketchbook work is brilliant!!



In year 13, photographers have been finishing their essay units and are now working on their personal investigation practical work. There are a wide range of projects from double exposure to cityscapes and nostalgia. We can't wait to see how they develop in final outcomes.

What an Expedition!

Friday saw expedition day come around, the first since before Covid!

15 year 11 students arrived at school, dressed ready to get out walking with the realisation that this was finally happening and real! There was a real buzz as we made sure all students' kit was ready, packed appropriately to stay dry, and group by group they were minibused to their starting point near Little Wymington. All three groups took different routes from their starting point, one group headed down to Poddington and across to Wollaston, the second group tracked across to Irchester before heading down to Wollaston with the third group heading north around the edge of Rushden before routing towards Irchester and Wollaston. All three groups then made their way into camp at Grendon Lakes.

Friday afternoon the teams were thrown an added challenge of dealing with the weather, the rain set in just after lunch and did not ease up, students finished day one walking in miserable weather but despite this, spirits were up! All students arrived into camp safely, though maybe with a few unplanned detours on route, and got tents pitched before drying off and warming up slightly (they were grateful for the heating in the toilet blocks!). Then it was cooking time where we saw an expedition first, chicken fajitas including salad! Hot meal and drink made, it was time to clean up and get ready for bed to make sure they got as much rest as possible ready for day 2.

Saturday arrived, very early for some who had struggled to sleep past 4am(!), and with it better weather arrived, it was dry and the wind had dropped. The teams got themselves up and sorted, breakfast made, tents down and were ready to go. After a quick route update for some, they were off! They were achy, tired but still in good spirits, pushing on through the pain and keeping everyone motivated. Once again the three groups took very different routes after their initial visit to Grendon village with one group heading across to Castle Ashby, Denton, Brafield and Little Houghton. The other 2 groups both headed down to Easton Maudit with one group splitting down to visit Horn Wood and Cold Oak Copse before heading to Castle Ashby and the other group headed down to visit Yardley Hastings before returning up past the Avenue and finishing at Chadstone.

Every student did themselves proud as they dug in and pushed through aching feet, painful injuries and supported each other, showing true Team Rushden spirit!

We are hopeful that some of these fab students will go on to complete their Silver Award and some maybe even reach Gold!

Bach's full name is Johann Sebastian Bach.

He was born on March 31st 1685 and sadly died 28th July 1750 after going blind and having a stroke.



Like most of his family, Bach was a talented musician. The instruments he could play include the violin, the harpsichord and the organ. His uncle taught him to play the organ and he was a very willing student.

Bach composed more than 1000 pieces of music. His most famous being the Brandenburg Concertos. The one I know is Toccata and Fugue in D minor because I've heard it on Halloween and in films.



He became more famous after he died because many of his works were released over a hundred years later.

Anyone can listen to Bach's music now thanks to the internet.

Home Learning

Dear Parents/Carers,

Home learning activities are set by all subjects, for all students as per the schedule below:

We set homework via our Google Platform, using an application called Google Classroom. This allows teachers to set really focused activities for all students, across a number of different learning platforms that we subscribe to to support our curriculum delivery.

We appreciate that communication regarding the home learning activities is crucial, so that you can support your child to complete their work by the set deadlines.

During lockdown, parents of older students may remember that we set-up a Google guardian notification which enabled parents to get a daily, or weekly (this is your choice) notification on tasks that have been set, with information on when work is due, and how many tasks are overdue.

We are currently in the process of setting up Google Guardian notifications for parents of all students in years 7 and 8, and we will be checking email addresses for other years on a rolling programme.

Over the next week, you should receive an email inviting you to be a Google Guardian. Please note that this may go into your Junk or Spam folder, so please check this regularly.

Once you have accepted this invitation, you will be able to confirm if you would like to receive daily or weekly reports.

The system does work better with google email addresses, so if you are yet to create an email account, we encourage you to set-up an account via the Google platform.

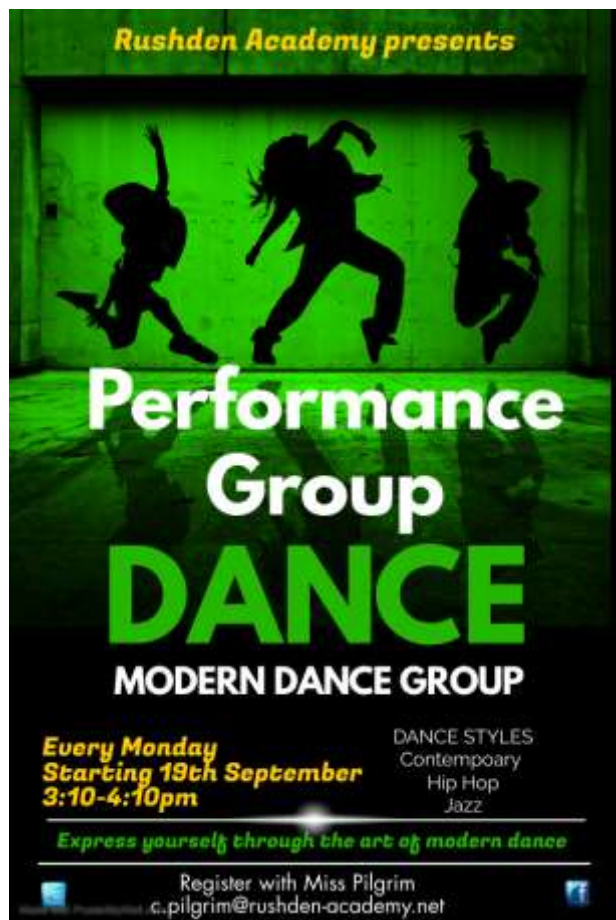

Performing Arts Update

Drama

Year 7 have been exploring their vocal skills this week. With a focus on George's Marvellous Medicine by Roald Dahl, we have been exploring how we change our voices for different characters and recognising what skills we use to do this. The students have enjoyed varying their voices and being able to identify what skills they are using to do this.

Dance

The Y11 dancers are currently on the Component 2 of their BTEC performing arts dance pathway course. Student are really enjoying this component as it explores professional repertoire and challenges the dancers individual performance and interpretive skills. Currently dancers are exploring the style of Hip-Hop.

Music

Year 9 students have been finalising their backing tracks for their songs this week and are starting to consider whether they are going to sing live or pre-record their lyrics into their bandlab project. Students that are singing live have been practising hard with their backing tracks to sort out timing and how it all fits together. Students that have decided to pre-record their lyrics have recorded in and editing the sound files, using effects to change the sound of the voice to suit the music and considering the blend in the mix but adjusting levels to make sure it is all balanced to a well rounded.

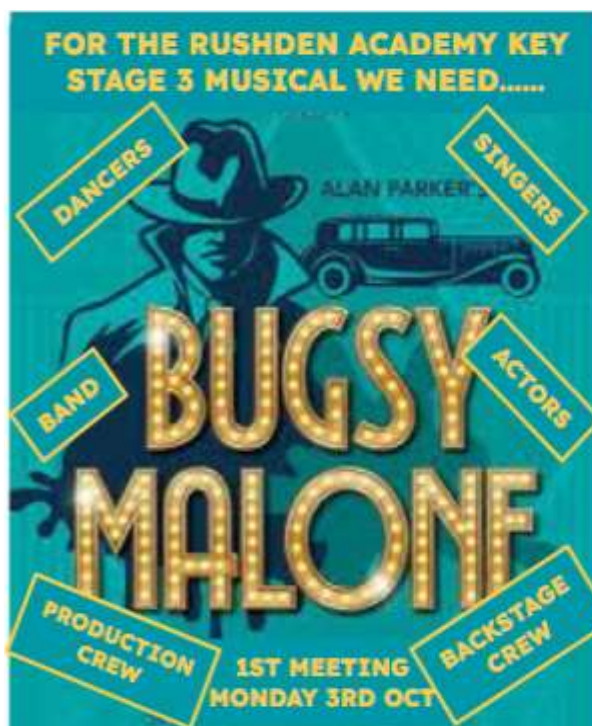
