Message From the Principal

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
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Team Rushden - United we stand, divided we fall

Dear Parent / Carer

The penultimate week of this half term has meant the start of the Summer exam period for our Year 11s and they have made a fantastic start with all students showing great levels of positivity and resilience.



Mrs Brainwood was on the assembly rota for this week and delivered a powerful assembly on the theme of stillness and mindfulness. Students were encouraged to think about how rare moments of genuine silence are and how useful such moments can be in terms of clarifying thoughts or thinking deeply about a particular problem. Mrs Brainwood shared an insightful anecdote about her father and Christmas morning in relation to the absence of all the usual hustle and bustle of any other day. The assembly finished with a story of people who went to the mountains in search of moments of silence and solitude and the benefits this had for them.

Thursday evening was parents' evening for Year 10 and it was nice to see parents and students receiving lots of feedback about how to improve in each of their subjects. The number of parents in attendance was slightly lower than we have seen at other evenings so we will be writing to parents to get your feedback on why some of you were unable to make it. There were some requests from parents about more detail in reports and following the Year 10 mock examinations in term 6, you will all receive a detailed breakdown of your child's performance as well as clear identification of topics and skills which need improving.

In a bid to help prepare Year 10 students for Year 11, in term 6, we will be introducing weekly mandatory maths, English and science homework for all Year 10 students. If students do not complete it then they will be collected to stay behind on Friday evenings in order to complete the work. We did exactly the same with Year 11 and it really supported students with their revision and so we are starting early with Year 10 to get them into good habits.

This Term in English

Year 7 and 8

This term, year 7 and 8 have been learning about some of Shakespeare's most popular plays!

In year 7, students have been introduced to a wide array of plays to get them used to Shakespeare's language and themes. The plays explored have included: *A Midsummer Night's Dream, Macbeth, Romeo and Juliet, The Merchant of Venice, Much Ado About Nothing* and *Julius Caesar.* Students have enjoyed exploring the plot and characters through a Whoosh! Which is a short and modern version of the play which encourages students to get up and improvise the main events. Next term, year 7 will be doing a creative writing unit called 'Alter Egos'- we hope they will be able to draw influence from everything they have learnt this term!

In Year 8, students have been diving into the tragic and treasonous world of Macbeth! We have considered the impact of the supernatural, explored themes of power and even learnt some context focusing on King James and his obsession with witches. Next term, year 8 will be exploring poetry through the ages which will include some of Shakespeare's sonnets so we hope they can apply everything they have learnt to analyse how language and structure has been used in the poems.

Year 9

This term, year 9 students have been introduced to some of the poems from the Edexcel GCSE relationship anthology. These poems include: La Belle Dame Sans Merci, My Last Duchess, Nettles, Sonnet 43, I wanna be yours and First Date He, First Date She. We hope that this small introduction will alleviate some of the pressure to get through all 15 poems next year when students start their GCSEs. Next term, students will be introduced to another GCSE text: Romeo and Juliet. We will explore the plot, characters and themes as well as analyse how Shakespeare used language and structure to interest and engage his audience.

Year 10

Over the whole of the summer term, year 10 will be partaking in their GCSE speaking and listening exam. This is a compulsory element to the English GCSE and will award students with a pass, merit or distinction grade. Students must present a 3-5 minute talk on a topic of their choice to an audience which will be recorded and sent to the examination board. We are doing all that we can to co-operate with our students, offering after school and lunch time recordings to alleviate some of the pressures and anxieties behind presenting to a whole class. We appreciate any and all support from parents in this matter- if students refuse, they unfortunately will gain a 'fail' which will be present on their GCSE certificate. If you have any questions about the speaking and listening element of the English GCSE then please get in contact with your child's English teacher or the Head of Faculty, Miss Neville.

Year 11

The time has come for year 11 to apply all that they have learnt during their journey with Team English! We have been revising for all of the papers- completing walking talking mocks, making flashcards with relevant quotations, analysing language and structure, writing creatively and rhetorically and ensuring we know the content of the exams inside out. The English team wish year 11 the best of luck and have every faith that they will blow the examiners away!




Mental Health Week at Rushden Academy



How to Navigate Difficult Conversations with Your Teenager

Important conversations with teenagers are among the biggest challenges of parenting. They can feel like walking a tightrope. Lean too much - or too little - into commands and restrictions and you're likely to tip over.

Conversations with teens are difficult for a number of reasons. First of all, adolescence is a time when young people develop their own identities. To try out different parts of those identities they make more decisions without their parents, some of which can be quite risky.

But teens are still dependent on parents and seek their love and approval - even if they don't want to admit it. Conversations that meet these complex needs often require flexibility, responsiveness and patience. Researchers are still learning about how parents can best support their teenagers' needs, but studies conducted so far point to some key things to keep in mind.

Talk about tricky topics often

Talk to your teenager, often and with interest. Engage them on topics that matter to them. When teens feel they can talk to non-judgmental parents about important topics they open up more. Along with the quality of conversation, the frequency also matters. Initiating more frequent conversations will help teens share more.

Listen with love

My own research shows that high-quality listening on your part can improve wellbeing in teenagers and lead them to be willing to share more in the future.

Listening well involves attending carefully to what your teenager says, attempting to understand issues from their perspective and conveying that you value and love them - even if you may not necessarily value what they've done or what they say.

Listen with an open mind

Listening does not require parents to agree to requests without good reason. At the start of the conversation, you can explain the difference between wanting to understand and being willing to accommodate your teen.

Explain your reasoning

Listening is not always enough, and parents are called to respond to, or direct, their child's actions. The way you do this can help teenagers understand the importance of a request beyond their parent's whim.

For example, a parent can give a command: "You have to put down your phone now!" Or, they could give a request with explanation: "It's important to put the phone down now that we're having family time so we can connect." Explaining decisions and making requests may not protect you from teenage protests, but doing so conveys your values and allows your teenager to make a choice about their behaviour. This ultimately helps teenagers to internalise or buy into parental rules and norms.

How to Navigate Difficult Conversations with Your Teenager

Think about tone of voice

Not just what parents say, but how they say it, matters. My research shows that warm, inviting and soft tones of voice are better received by adolescents, who report that that a supportive tone of voice helps them to get on board with parental messages, feel positive emotions and experience a sense of connection with parents.

In contrast, pressuring tones of voice can alienate young people and undermine efforts to communicate effectively for positive change.

Think about your own wellbeing

Listening well, and using ideal tones of voice and words to convey messages to teens, may be difficult when parents are exhausted, under pressure, or have been dealing with difficult behaviour from their children. Parents and children both benefit when these conversations take place after a good rest, or at least a deep breath. It may help to track your own mood, and step away from a conversation when you are not in the right headspace.

It's also important to watch out for your own feelings of threat and fear during conversations, because these can get in the way of being responsive, loving, and still firm – as needed – when things get tough.

Understand that a conversation can't solve everything

Adolescents are on their own journeys to growing, and often these journeys are influenced by some, often complex, personality factors, peer influence, and mental health difficulties. Parents certainly have the power to encourage teenagers to talk about issues affecting them and promote their wellbeing, but parents also deserve to have compassion for themselves as well as for their teens. They don't have infinite power; doing their very best might just have to be enough.
