## Team Rushden - United we stand, divided we fall

Dear Parent / Carer
I hope you all had a pleasant and restful summer. It was a genuine pleasure to welcome all the students back to school on Tuesday and hear about all the exciting things they have spent their summer doing.


On Tuesday and Wednesday we collapsed lessons so that students could engage with a range of activities and team building sessions which focused on our core values of being Respectful, Smart, Hardworking, Resilient and Team Players. These values are central to everything we do to ensure that everyone works together to continually strengthen our Team Rushden ethos.
I welcomed all students back, in assemblies, which gave them an opportunity to share what they spent their time doing in the holidays. It also encouraged them to reflect on the characteristics of strong teams through discussions around the Lionesses and the NASA team which recently built the James Webb telescope. Mr Firth also delivered an assembly reminding students of expectations to ensure that we start the year as positively as possible.
With reading being such an important part of education here, all students also undertook reading age assessments to ensure firstly that they are reading books appropriate for their reading age, and secondly to allow us to put support in place for when reading ages are below chronological age. There is a very strong correlation between reading age and outcomes and so we are committed to doing all that we can to ensure that developing reading skill is a priority.

Despite a miserable summer in terms of weather, it has been particularly warm this first week. I am aware that some schools have permitted students to wear PE kits and should the local authority issue any weather warnings we will follow suit. Looking at the forecast for next week it is set to get cooler which will make things much less uncomfortable in school.
Finally, I just wanted to remind you all that the school day now starts at 8:30 and so the Spencer Park gate will shut at $8: 25 \mathrm{am}$. Please remind your children of this and encourage them to leave 5 minutes earlier to avoid them having to walk round to the Hayway and receive a late mark.

## Student Induction Days 2023 - Our Values

It was wonderful to welcome all our students back this week after the summer holidays. This year, we began the term with two induction days so that they would all be fully prepared and informed for the weeks ahead.

## WHAT IS International Irteracy day?

- Tuesday 8 September
- A chance to celebrate literacy worldowide!
- It first started in 26 October 1966 at 14th session of UNESCO's Generd. conference. It was celebrated for the first time in 1967 . Its aim is to highlight the importance of literacy to individuals, communities and societies.

International Literacy Day takes place on September 8 every year to raise awareness and concern for literacy problems that exist within our own local communities as well as globally. International Literacy Day was founded by proclamation of The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, or UNESCO, in 1966 "to remind the public of the importance of literacy as a matter of dignity and human rights." International Literacy Day brings ownership of the challenges of illiteracy back home to local communities where literacy begins, one person at a time.

What exactly is literacy? Miriam-Webster Dictionary defines literacy as "the quality or state of being literate: educated...able to read and write." Because you are able to read this post and no doubt spend a lot of time reading online, it may seem incredulous to learn there are people living and working in your own community who not only cannot read this post, but are unable to read a book, a restaurant menu, a road sign, a voting ballot, an instruction manual, a prescription bottle label, or a cereal box.
Can you imagine navigating modern-day life without the basic ability to read and write? Wiping out illiteracy in every local community around the world is what International Literacy Day is all about.
International Literacy Day was first conceived at the "World Conference of Ministers of Education on the Eradication of Illiteracy" held in Tehran, Iran in 1965. The following year UNESCO took the lead and declared September 8 as International Literacy Day, with the primary purpose being "...to remind the international community of the importance of literacy for individuals, communities and societies, and the need for intensified efforts towards more literate societies." One year later, the global community accepted the challenge of ending illiteracy by participating in the first International Literacy Day.


## Celebrations in 2023

Rapidly changing global context took a new meaning over the past years, hampering the literacy progress and widening inequalities across world regions, countries, and populations. In lowand middle-income countries, the share of 10-year -old children who could not read and understand a simple text with comprehension has increased from 57 per cent in 2019 to an estimated 70 per cent in 2022.

In this context, this year's International Literacy Day will be celebrated worldwide under the theme, 'Promoting literacy for a world in transition: Building the foundation for sustainable and peaceful societies'.

Ideas for how you can celebrate International Literacy Day
-Speak to our library staff about how you can get involved with the new student newsletter!
-Create a poster, book review or photo montage of your favourite books and share it with the UK Literacy Association (UKLA.org)
-Gift a book to a friend or relative who you think will enjoy it
-Conduct an online search for fairy tales or stories from other parts of the World

ILD2023 will be an opportunity to join efforts to accelerate progress towards the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goal 4 (SDG4) on education and lifelong learning and to reflect on the role of literacy in building more inclusive, peaceful, just, and sustainable societies. In doing so, it will embrace the reciprocal relations between literacy and other areas of development: Literacy is central to the creation of such societies, while progress in other areas of development contributes to generating interest and motivation of people to acquire, use, and further develop their literacy and numeracy skills.

Under this theme, ILD2023 will be celebrated at the global, regional, country, and local levels across the world. At the global level, a conference will be organized in person and online on Friday, 8 September 2023, in Paris, France. This global celebration will include the award ceremony of the UNESCO International Literacy Prizes to announce this year's outstanding prizewinning programmes.

The event will be webcast which means you will be able to view it online!

## Are You Eligible for Free School Meals?

If you are in receipt of any of the following, your child may be eligible for free school meals.

- Income Support
- Income based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit, with no element of Working Tax Credit, and a household income below £16,190 (as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs)
- Guarantee Element of State Pension Credit
- Universal Credit - income dependant
